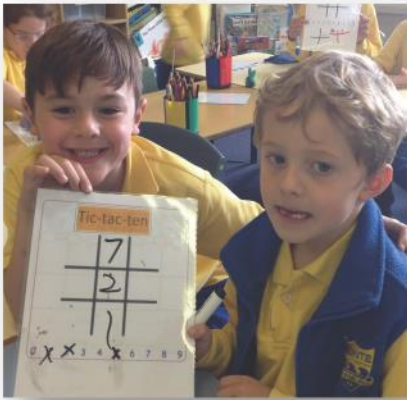

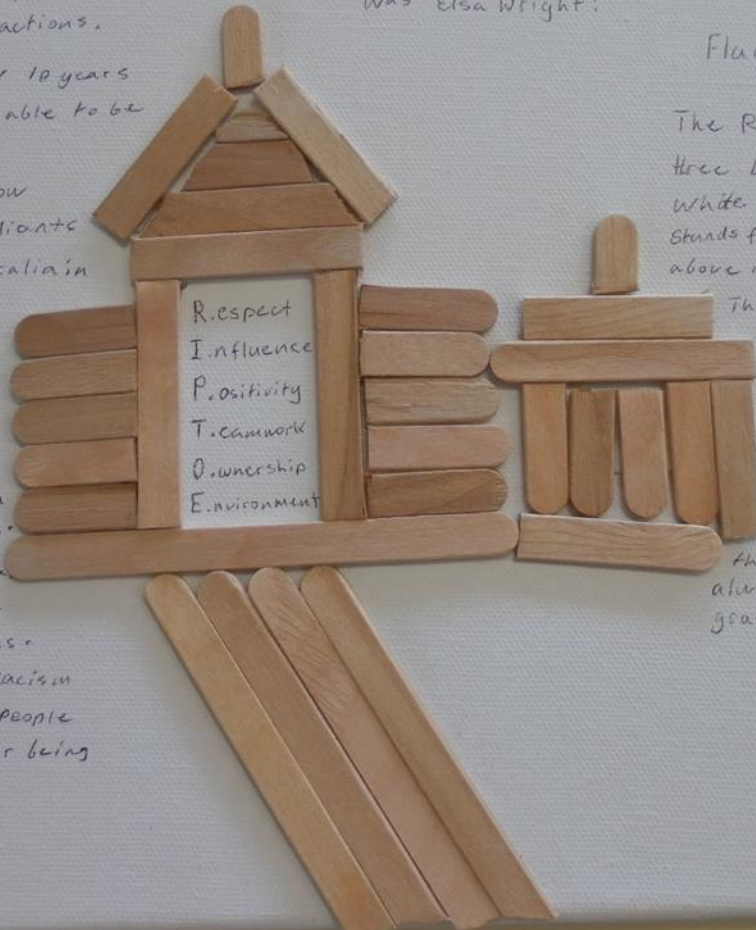

Laws of the colony of Chair Hill!

- Article 1. A man may protect himself by show of force if physically provoked.
- Article 2. No one shall take another's assigned belongings, without permission from the owners.
- Article 3. A Citizen of Chair Hill may sue for justice against any recognised party, including many branches of government.
- Article 4. To become a citizen, you must own a permission document that has intelligible information on it, you must have a job and have committed no crimes. Only then may you trial to become a citizen.

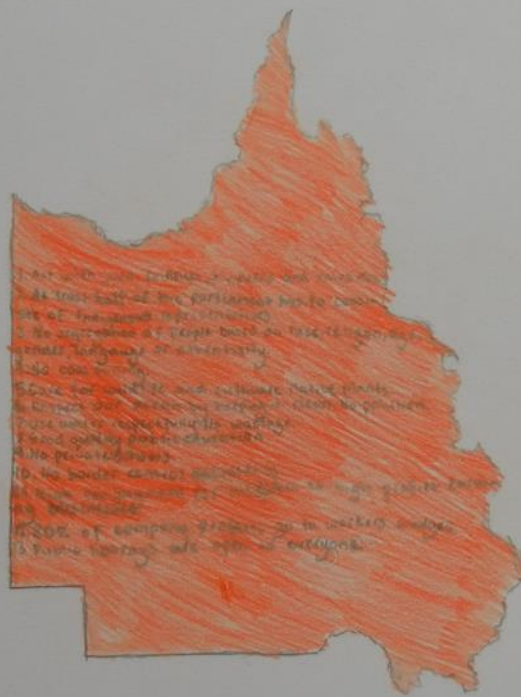

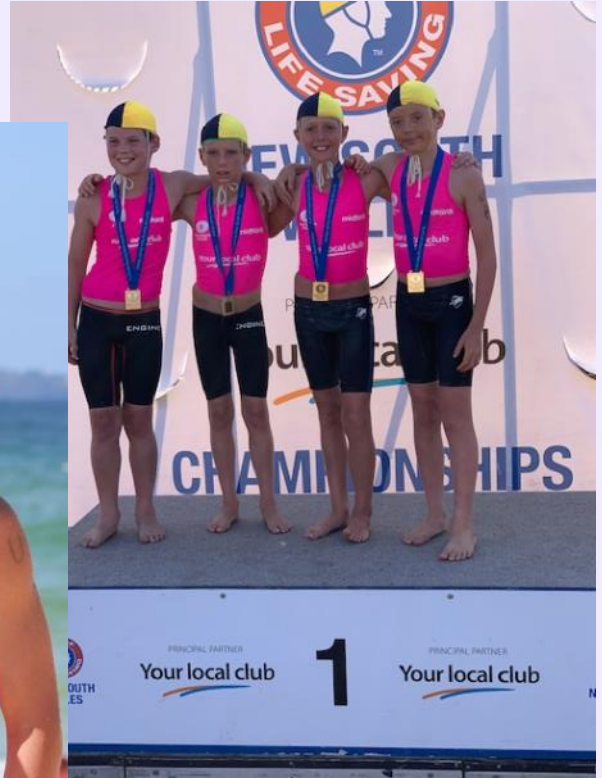
Aurice

Dear All,

I trust you are receiving the emails from the school regarding updates on the Coronavirus. The department is updating information regularly. We have ramped up hygiene routines at school and students are given reminders to wash their hands during the day. Thank you for advising your teacher of any travel plans. Just Like You celebrates what makes a person different through interactive activities, and in turn students learn that people with a disability are the same as everyone else – they are 'Just Like You.'

	First Workshop	Second Workshop
Stage One (Years 1-2)	Students learn to identify difference as a positive thing which should be valued and celebrated.	Students discover what a disability is and learn how to be inclusive and treat everyone with respect and understanding.
Stage Two (Years 3-4)	Students discover the different forms of disabilities such as physical, invisible and sensory and learn to empathise with the challenges some people with these disabilities may face. Stage Three (Years 5-6)	Preconceived ideas around disability are challenged and students practice integrating alternative modes of communication and movement in to their classroom environment. The voluntary contribution has remained unchanged for over ten years.

There continues to be great support for the provision of Spanish at Bronte PS. The on-going contribution of \$160 (in 2019 \$140) invoiced in Term 1 will ensure this quality language program continues. As in previous years, parents/carers will be informed of co-curricular activities, some excursions, and sport programs in which we ask parents to support in order to provide the richest curriculum possible at our school. The Spanish price increase in 2020 is due to the cost divided by a smaller student population.

In 2019 we used your contributions to enhance classroom delivery and opportunities in ways that reflect the community's high expectations of learning. You funded a teacher for two days per week. I also acknowledge the ever present support of the P&C in upgrading student bathrooms.

In 2020, we will use your contributions to support classroom learning, including the provision of flexible and future focussed furniture and other resources agreed on by the P&C.

There is no better investment for your children's future than to support their education. We understand that families have different capacities to contribute. We value whatever contributions parents/carers wish to make. **The school is always willing to support families experiencing financial challenges. All requests to me for support remain confidential.** I can also reassure our community that no child is denied regular learning opportunities due to financial circumstances.

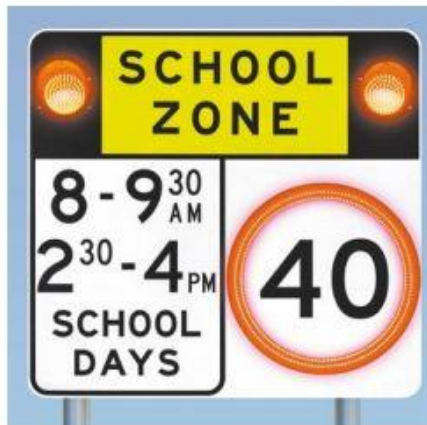
Application forms for your designated local high school were sent home recently and need to be returned to school by Friday 13 March.

Driving and parking safely near your school

The beginning and end of the school day are busy times for pedestrians and drivers outside schools.

You can help keep children safe by remembering the following:

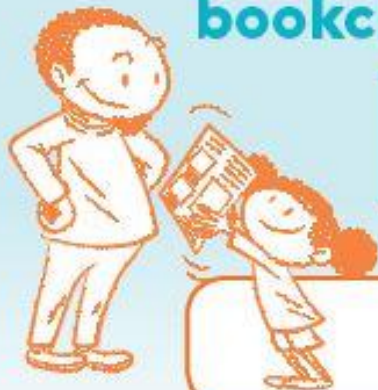
Premier's Reading Challenge

Tips for parents and carers for participating in the Challenge

- D Find out the name(s) of your school's Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC) coordinator(s) and how they plan to administer the Challenge.
- D Familiarise yourself with the new [PRC student website](#). There is a video on the [PRC Support site that you can watch that demonstrates how login, search for books and add them to a Student Reading Record \(SRR\)](#).
- D Visit the [Premier's Reading Challenge Support website](#). It allows you to search for information about the PRC and how to use the PRC website and also how to [contact the PRC team](#).
- D Set reminders for Challenge [opening and closing dates](#) in your and your child's calendar.
- D Find out your [child's logon details](#). For public schools, students' logon will be the same one they use to access computers and the internet at school. Non-government students will need to contact the PRC Coordinator at their school if they cannot remember their login details.
- D Assist your child to borrow books from the school or local library. Listen to your child read and talk about the story/ characters/ information. Read to or with your child if she/he is participating in the K-2 Challenge.
- D Help your child to add books to her/his Student Reading Record **regularly**.
- D Follow The Arts Unit on Facebook and the NSW PRC on Instagram to keep up to date about information about the Challenge throughout the year. We regularly run contests and Author events your child may be interested in taking part in.
- D Contact your child's **PRC coordinator** if:
 - Your child has any difficulty using her/his logon details to access the PRC website.
 - You are concerned that your child's name is spelt incorrectly in the PRC website.
 - If you need to check your child's Challenge history, please contact your child's PRC coordinator.
- D Your child's online Student Reading Record must have the required number of books recorded to complete the Challenge by the [student closing date](#). School PRC coordinators have an extra two weeks to validate the SRR. **Only students with a validated SRR are eligible for a certificate.**
- D **In the final weeks of the Challenge, log on regularly to the website to check the status of your child's SRR.** Contact your child's PRC coordinator if you are concerned your child's SRR has not been validated.
